This book worked for him because it clued in his brain to the mysteries of the English alphabet by triggering not only his visual senses, but also his auditory and kinesthetic ones.

How Jolie Canolil Phonics Works - Learn by Seeing, Hearing, Drawing.


Jolie Canoli Phonics books teach children with reading aloud, kinesthetic activites, fun chants and songs, and game play. The first two books teach all the phonic sounds of the entire alphabet, and the rules for Silent E. The parent, teacher or student reads the book aloud, rehearsing the letter sounds. Letter tracing is included in the book to provide a kinesthetic activity that involves the brain in memorizing the letter shape, as well as teaching proper handwriting skills. Playing cards assist kids in recalling letter sounds through play. Finally the coloring book provides drawing, matching, and reading activities.

The Coloring Book


The coloring book includes a coloring page for each letter sound taught in the Jolie Canoli phonics series. There are also fun activity pages that teach word blending with simple 2 or 3-letter words, as well as matching and handwriting activities.

Buddy & Hedgehog pages give your child the chance to rehearse the letter sounds and practice blending those sounds to form words. Blending can be a challenge for children so it is important to model the process. For example, with the word "cab," point to each letter sound and have the child repeat each sound after you say it, then say the word in full. In other words, you would say, "/k/ ... /a/ ... /b/ ... ka--- /b/. Cab." Take your time in demonstrating how to blend sounds. Consider saying the sounds slowly at first, then faster with smaller breaks between the sounds, until the child can guess the word themselves. To help your child to recognize the distinct sounds in a word, encourage them to tap their lap, or each letter on the page, as they say each sound.


